From the Associate Dean

Dean Blasi and I have begun to have informal chats with students on Monday mornings and afternoons. Paulester Howard, an administrative assistant on the fourth floor, will randomly select students and contact them to determine if they can be available to talk with us for approximately thirty minutes. We have learned much from our first meetings, and we look forward to meeting as many of you as possible.

At the request of the SBA, the faculty recently reconsidered whether the doors in the fourth floor reception area could be left unlocked. For security reasons, the doors will remain locked. Because of the Law School's location, we have experienced significant theft. The security problem is not unique to the fourth floor, of course, and we are considering ways to address the problem in other areas of the building. While no one believes that students are responsible for any of the thefts, unlocking the fourth floor doors would exacerbate the problem. We are quite concerned, however, that the locked doors might send the wrong message to our students. Of course, we encourage you to visit us.

You may not know that you can save a trip to the fourth floor to determine whether a faculty member is available by using one of the two "house" phones. One is on the first floor near the elevators, and the other is on the second floor at the end of the hallway where student organization offices are located. The fourth floor receptionist's phone number is 1-2096.

We have put a television in the student lounge on the first floor to permit and encourage viewing the Senate confirmation hearings on Judge Clarence Thomas. Another television is located in the faculty lounge on the fourth floor.

DESCRIPTION OF CLASSES

INTRODUCTION TO COMPUTER LAB

This half hour session will cover the equipment of the Lab, the menu on the computers, formatting floppy diskettes, and the "Do's and Don'ts" of Computer Lab policy.

For students who have limited experience with computers.

INTRODUCTION TO WORDPERFECT 5.1 (wordprocessing)

This 1-1/2 hour class will cover the bare-bone basics of creating, editing, and printing text documents.

For students who have little or no experience with WordPerfect.

Prerequisite for this class is the Introduction to Computer Lab or previous experience with personal computers.

- There is a telephone available for student use on the second floor. It is at the end of hall on which the student association offices are located. This phone is provided for your free use by the Student Bar Association.
- In conjunction with the faculty and administration, the S.B.A. is sponsoring a magazine drive to help stock the libraries of several facilities in the Atlanta area. Currently, all old magazines turned in to the school will be sent to the library at the Veterans Hospital. With recent budget cuts, the Veterans Hospital library has been given no funds and most, if not all, magazine subscriptions have expired. The magazines supplied to them are deeply appreciated. Please bring all of your old magazines to school and place them in the receptacle next to the S.B.A. office on the second floor. Your help is appreciated.
- As part of an ongoing process to improve administration-student relations at GSU, Acting Dean Blasi and Associate Dean Morgan are implementing a series of informal monthly meetings with students. Students will be randomly selected to attend meetings. The informal meetings are designed to provide students and administrators an opportunity to communicate their concerns.
- The administration is continuing to review the policies governing examination scheduling and examination conflicts. There has been no resolution to date.
- The administration has been asked to review the current faculty evaluation forms and the procedure for completing those forms. The evaluation system was not designed for the College of Law, and as such, does not currently reflect student concerns.
- The administration has been asked to review the current procedure followed for selecting the speaker for the hooding ceremony. Students want to participate in the selection of the speaker. Hopefully a student committee can be formed which will make a firm recommendation to the administration.

Student Trial Lawyers Association 1991 Fall Tryout Competition

Each Fall Semester the Student Trial Lawyers Association holds an annual tryout competition for its members who wish to be selected to represent Georgia State University College of Law in a Spring Tournament.

This year there will be separate tryouts for the second and third year class. Hopefully, this change will alleviate any fears on the part of second year students about competing against third year students. The second year students will tryout on Friday October 11, and the third year students will compete on Saturday October 12, 1991. The students will compete in teams of two and will either represent the State or the Defendant in a criminal murder case. Each student will be evaluated individually and not as a team. The trial will last 36 minutes, and students can sign up at any time before September 21, 1991.

To sign up for the Fall Competition, students need to place their name and their partners name on the sign up sheet posted on the STLA office door in Room 228. The problem is on reserve in the Law Library.

The students selected will compete in one of the following Tournaments:

- 1) American Bar Association
February 1992 6 lawyers
- 2) Association of Trial Lawyers of America (ATLA)
March 1992 4 lawyers & 4 witnesses
- 3) Georgia Intrastate Tournament
April 1992 6 lawyers & 6 witnesses

This year 14 3L's and 12 2L's will be selected to compete during the Spring Tournaments. Since Evidence is not taught until the second year of law school, it is impossible to allow 1L's to compete in the Fall Competition. However, all 1L's are invited to attend the tryouts as both witnesses and jurors. In order to participate, a student needs to sign up on the Juror list or a witness list posted on the STLA Office door in Room 228.
